~The story of Anthony~

Let me introduce you to our friend, Anthony.

Anthony has been coming into The City Gate now for about 5 years. It was my pleasure to sit and visit with Anthony and to hear about how he got here. His story starts in northern California. Most of his childhood was in Antioch but as a sophomore in high school his family moved to Paradise. Anthony graduated from Paradise High School. In 2001, Anthony moved to Washington where he had family in the Tacoma area. He found himself traveling east to take a job with a friend in Sandpoint. Upon arriving in Sandpoint, and through some miscommunication, Anthony realized the job wouldn't work. They were needing a delivery driver and, well, he didn't have a driver's license. Struggling with alcohol abuse and limited on funds, Anthony was quickly running out of money. He took to hitch hiking and made it as far as Spokane. So, Spokane it was.

Five years ago, Anthony found himself trying to hitchhike out of Spokane at Christmas time. He sat on the freeway on ramp with no luck of a ride. He saw a sign for a 24-hour shelter and felt a sense of hope and relief... That is until he approached the front and was laughed at, as it was a women's only shelter. Thankfully they pointed him in the right direction. Anthony found a shelter to crash at and felt the generosity that Spokane had to offer our homeless community.

This was the start of a journey that brings us to today. When asked if he plans on staying in Spokane, Anthony is clear that he has no plans to leave. While he enjoys visiting his Western Washington family, his roots are spreading in Spokane.

Anthony began involving himself in church after he settled in Spokane. For the first time Anthony felt a connection with the church. When the church he had been regularly attending moved, Anthony found himself looking for somewhere to go and grow. Through a friend, Anthony came to The City Gate. He was already camping nearby and honestly, "I was digging the FREE coffee ALL day long!"

It has been a series of ups and downs for Anthony and The City Gate. He would be the first to tell you that there were times of frustration and even times that he wanted to walk away. Not always seeing eye-to-eye with everyone on staff, Anthony found that he could be honest and open with James. Through their relationship he has come to a place where he can forgive more freely. Not just with The City Gate but in life.

Anthony recalls one time when he was really upset. After making a vow never to come back he realized that he was hungry, and The City Gate was the only place open for dinner. He didn't just come in for dinner. He talked to James about his anger and thankfully he forgave and returned. Maybe it was just for the meal at first, but Anthony has come to belong here. You can ask any staff or volunteer and they will agree.



Astonished.” We are anxious for that moment, and we know that God has given Anthony a gift in his music and we will patiently wait for him to share that with us. In the meantime, don’t be surprised if you see Anthony on a street corner. Some will call him a panhandler, but he prefers the term “entertainer”. He makes ends meet but will tell you honestly, “I don’t do it for the money. I do it for the smiles.” His clever signs will get a reaction every time and Anthony loves the rush he gets from seeing a reaction. In all he does, Anthony IS an entertainer. We are honored to be a place where he feels welcomed and willing to grow.

I was born and raised in Spokane with several brothers and sisters. From a young age, I wanted to be in the medical field but I had no idea or in what context I would find myself. By God’s grace, He began to open doors and close others, and I eventually found myself in a nursing school here in Spokane. These past two years at school have been challenging yet so rewarding. In our last semester, we had the preference of where and with whom we would do our community clinical. I chose The City Gate, yet had no idea how much of a personal impact the staff and the people would have on me. As a nursing student, I had the preconception that I would come to The City Gate to educate and teach individuals things related to their health. This is far from what has happened. I have been the one who has been taught. I have been taught the importance of human dignity, the power of sacrifice whether big or small, and the power of friendships and respect. I have seen joy, I have seen anger and I have seen individuals who have little hope to cling on to. Yet through all of this, I have been taught that every single human, whether at The City Gate or anywhere else has intrinsic value and worth. I will never forget the friendships that I have with these individuals. I have been blessed to sit across the table and listen to many life stories and hear of much brokenness yet often times hope-filled. If anything, I have learned that I am not much different than many of these individuals. I am so thankful for this opportunity to participate in the work that The City Gate is doing and I pray that God will continue to bless it as it has blessed countless individuals.



I have been a volunteer at The City Gate for about 25 years. During these years I have seen God’s Grace at work because we have stood by our mission statement, “To reclaim, rebuild and restore the lost and broken lives of the people of our inner-city” Some of our staff are former substance abusers. They have stayed at The City Gate to give back to our clients what The Lord gave them. Many of our Alberta House tenants are also former substance abusers.
